The CSDP module will include cadets participating in the international semester, along with 30 cadets from the Military Academy. They will be divided into syndicates to work on project-based tasks and participate in a joint exercise utilizing the PACAST simulator. During this exercise, they will perform tasks within the framework of a European Union Battlegroup, enhancing their practical understanding of multinational cooperation and joint operations. Additionally, they will attend lectures designed to broaden their understanding of international security threats and the specific dynamics of global security.

The course will encompass five intensive training days, featuring a combination of guest lectures, syndicate group sessions, sports activities, a cultural visit, and a joint simulation exercise.

Cadets will attend expert-led guest lectures designed to deepen their understanding of international security threats and defense strategies. Throughout the week, they will work in syndicates to complete project-based assignments, promoting teamwork and analytical skills. In addition to classroom activities, participants will engage in sports sessions aimed at enhancing physical conditioning and team cohesion. A guided visit to Wrocław will provide cultural insights and a break from academic tasks. The program will culminate in a joint exercise using the PACAST simulator, where cadets will collaborate in a simulated EU Battlegroup scenario, applying their skills in a practical, mission-oriented environment.
